President's Report (2012 – 2013)

Three Council meetings were held since the last AGM to discuss the Association's plans and activities. It is our great honour to have the current principal, five advisors and some former council members to sit in our meetings to provide invaluable feedback. Alumnae assistants were also invited to join our council meetings.

(I) Activities

1. Photo-taking Day

The second Photo-taking Day, the Founder's Day Service and AGM were held on 31st March, 2012. Highlight of this full day event was a birthday party held in the Silcocks Hall to celebrate the 80th birthday of Rev. C.C.LEE. A total of 107 participants and 8 guests enjoyed the event. Another popular activity was the classes on making teddy bears in school uniforms.

2. Farewell Day

The Farewell Day was held on 14th July 2012 and was well attended by over 2000 alumnae. Highlights of the event included a Thanksgiving Service organized by the school's Religious Committee, a mass dance held in the school hall and sale of different types of souvenirs.

(II) Liaison

1. YWGSAA Newsletter

The fall issue (Nov 2012) was published and distributed to members either online or by post. The content covered a wide range of topics such as school redevelopment, fundraising stories, interviews of teachers and alumnae, homecoming day and farewell day on 31 March and 14 July respectively, alumnae news and school news etc.

The spring issue was published and distributed in early March 2013. The theme for this issue was "Ying Wa Documentary". It is a project directed by Cheung Yuen Ting, Mabel (68') and produced by Wong Wai, Eunice (68'). There was also an interview article with Mr. Charles Chong, brother of the late Chong Yuet Ming (53'), who shared with us his valuable views on and experience in social service and education.

News of alumnae functions and latest update of school development have been posted in the alumnae website which serves as an effective channel for local and overseas alumnae to keep in touch with the Alma Mata and the Association.

(III) Interest Groups

1. Alumnae Choir

The alumnae choir has regular singing practice on alternative Saturday afternoon .We have the pleasure to have Ms Ruth Lau and Ms YY Wong as the conductor and pianist respectively. The choir led the Hymns singing session in the Farewell Day to old campus on 14th July 2012. We sang well-loved hymns with our alumnae in Silcocks Hall to recall joyful memories of school days. The alumnae choir also performed with the school choir in the fund-raising Cantonese Opera Concert「粤韻濃情繋英華」on 16th October, 2012.

2. Caring Team

The team visited senior alumnae Ms Cheng Wan Tann, Cecilia, Ms Ho Shuk Chun and Ms Kwan Yuek Lan. They are all over 90 years old but still leading an active life. It is so encouraging and pleasurable to chat with our senior alumnae as they have much wisdom and faith to share with us.

(IV) Projects

1. Mentorship Programme

The year 2012 marked the 8th Anniversary of the Programme.

A dinner talk on "A Glimpse at the Professions" was held on 22 June 2012 and was well attended by 20 mentors and 35 mentees. Alumnae from the medicine/health and hotel/tourism professions shared their working experiences, including job nature, entry requirements and career paths.

A promotion talk was held on 28 September 2012 to recruit mentees in the new academic year. 21 students registered as mentees and 21 alumnae volunteered their service as mentors. An orientation session was held on 17 November 2012.

The first group activity "Career Expo 2012-13" was conducted on 26 January 2013. The two keynote speeches titled "Career Planning and Exploration" and "Interview Tips" received very positive feedbacks from the audiences, including 110 mentees and non-mentees. Afterward, 25 alumnae from twelve different professions shared their working experiences in classrooms, while participants joined these brief talks according to their individual choices. Most of the girls found the event useful and interesting.

2. Bible Giving

At the beginning of the school year, each S1 student received a Bible as a welcoming gift from the Association with the name of the student handwritten on the Bible to add a personal touch.

3. Alumnae Database

Working closely with the Ambassador Scheme, great efforts were made to upkeep and update the alumnae records in our database. Clearance of duplicated or outdated data was carried out throughout the year. There were altogether 5,338 records of alumnae and friends in our database (as at 6 February 2013). Alumnae were encouraged to send emails to alumnae@ywgs.edu.hk to revise their information in our database whenever necessary.

4. School Archives Collection

A Task Group on School Archives was set up by the IMC at the end of 2012 to take care of issues related to the collection and preservation of school items and to prepare for the setting up of the Archives of Ying Wa Girls' School and the former London Missionary Society in the new school campus. Two council members presently responsible for the Archives project were invited to join. We look forward to working closely with the Task Group on the actual work and deployment of manpower/resources.

5. Video Documentary – "Transformation"

- a. Initiated a year ago by school, this video project aims to capture the growth of S1 students as they move from the Robinson school building, through the temporary school site at Shamshuipo until they move back, in their final year at school, to the new campus. The video recordings will be edited into a documentary to celebrate the opening of the new school building and to commemorate this very unique period of our school history.
- b. At the beginning of the academic year 2011-2012, forty S1 students were nominated by teachers and they were filmed during major school events (e.g. Swimming Gala, Christmas celebrations, Farewell to Robinson Campus, receiving school report, etc.). The production crew captured individual moments of triumph and despair, when they celebrated, struggled, and when they overcame fears and frustrations.
- c. Among this batch of students, thirteen girls of unique family background were selected for close-up follow-through (e.g. a typical school day in the Robinson Campus, attending extra-curricular activities at Ying Wa or outdoor adventure-based training and community service project, etc.) The

- crew is in the process of filming the students as they adapt to the temporary school site and capturing them during family days.
- d. The production team is made up of volunteers and a small number of hired professionals. The volunteers are mainly alumnae and a number of parents. Their generosity with their time and effort is what made the project possible. It is a major challenge for the production team to continuously recruit and train volunteers.
